The Pitcairn Islands are situated lat. 25Deg. 04 minS Lon. 30deg. 05"W (for you boatie buffs). They are about 4,800 Km. from New Zealand lying towards South America. The first inhabitants to settle the Islands were Polynesians of unknown origin. Someone reckoned from Mangareva some 490 km to the NW.

Discovery of Pitcairn Island . Captain Philip Carteret first spotted Pitcairn Island in 1767 but couldn't land due to rough seas. He miscalculated its location, marking it miles away from its true position. Years later, Captain Cook showed some interest, but it wasn't until the Bounty mutineers arrived in 1790 that the island gained attention.

Ducie Island is situated approximately 500 kilometers east of the territory's capital, Pitcairn Island. It spans an area of 6 square kilometers, with a width of 2.4 kilometers to the northeast and 1.6 kilometers to the southwest.

In 2015 I spent three months on the remote British island of Pitcairn in the Pacific. Pitcairn is home to just 42 people, most of whom are descendants of the Bounty Mutiny. In 2004, the island's romantic image was ripped apart by a series of child abuse trials. Now just one child remains. An enigmatic place - legendary and infamous.

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The mutineers turning Bligh and some of the officers and crew adrift from HMS Bounty on 29 April 1789. Adamstown, the only settlement on the Islands. In 1790, nine of the mutineers from the British naval vessel HMS Bounty, along with the native Tahitian men and women who were with them (six men, 11 women, and a baby girl), settled on Pitcairn Island and set fire to the Bounty.

The Pitcairn Islands once forbade holding hands in public, as well as dancing, drinking alcohol and smoking. Pitcairn has since abolished these laws and even legalized same-sex marriage in 2015. Still, certain behaviors have become uniquely normalized in

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
